- define the main theories describing its internal relations and processes and predicting future development;
- briefly describe the political system of the European Union and the activities of its main institutions:
- constructively discuss your knowledge and opinions on the topic of European integration with the help of relevant arguments and present them in a cultured manner before a professional or lay audience.

Course contents:

- 1. Introduction to the issue, the beginnings and basic stages of the development of European politics
- 2. European politics and various attempts to unify it (Charlemagne, Holy Roman Empire, Napoleon Bonaparte, etc.)
- 3. The first post-war attempts to institutionalize European integration
- 4. The launch of the European integration project in the context of the threat from the USSR
- 5. Neofunctionalism and intergovernmentalism as main competing theories of European integration
- 6. The boom in European integration in the 1950s and 1960s, the crisis of the 1970s and the relaunch from the mid-1980s
- 7. Enlargement as an important aspect of integration, affecting the very functioning of the EU
- 8. Intergovernmental conferences and negotiation of founding treaties
- 9. Main EU institutions: European Commission
- 10. Main institutions of the EU: Council of the EU
- 11. Main institutions of the EU: European Parliament
- 12. Main institutions of the EU: European Court of Justice
